Maryland's Division of Rehabilitation Services (DORS) enjoyed another productive year. Through the Vocational Rehabilitation Program, Pre-Employment Transition Services, and the Disability Determination Services, the Division served almost 100,000 youth and adults with significant disabilities, assisting them in achieving their goals of employment, economic self-sufficiency, and independence in their communities. DORS' Vocational Rehabilitation Program continued to serve those with the most significant disabilities.

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), including amendments to the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, has set the stage for enhancing services to students and youth with significant disabilities, for a strengthening the workforce system in Maryland, and for improving connections between education and career preparation. You can learn more about DORS' activities to implement the provisions of WIOA in the Annual Report.

In July 2014, the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) was signed into law.


DORS is a core program of WIOA and the Division has taken many steps toward implementing the Act this year, including:

- Being a key participant in the development of the Maryland WIOA Combined State Plan, this was submitted and approved by the U.S. Departments of Labor and Education.
- Partnering with the Maryland State Department of Education, Maryland Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (DLLR), The Maryland Leadership Education and Development (LEAD) Program, the Maryland Department of Human Resources (DHR), local school systems, and One Stops to implement WIOA.
- Sponsoring a Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) symposium, attended by nearly 300 DORS staff and community partners.
- Conducting several trainings on Pre-ETS for DORS staff.
- Participated in more than thirty outreach/educational events regarding transition/Pre-ETS services.
- Developed DORS' policies and a fact sheet on Pre-ETS.
- Hired 6 DORS counselor to provide Pre-ETS services.
- Updated the DORS website to include Pre-ETS information.
- Served 766 Pre-ETS students.

Moving forward with WIOA, DORS will:

- Provide a coordinating meeting in January of 2017 for 14C providers to discuss how DORS will provide career counseling.
- Provide career counseling to an estimated 200 individuals currently earning subminimum wage.
- Update cooperative agreements with WIOA partnership programs.
- Partner with DLLR and Apprenticeship USA to involve more Marylanders with disabilities.
- Work more closely with DHR to provide services to individuals receiving Temporary Cash Assistance.
- Finalize a DORS-DLLR data sharing MOU so that we can fulfill our Federal obligation to provide quarterly wage data to the Rehabilitation Services Administration.





DORS prepared 9,121 students with disabilities to transition from high school to post-secondary education, career training, and careers.


Transitioning youth comprise 36% of DORS' VR total open caseload.








DORS' Workforce & Technology Center's Childcare Provider class is a 12-week **partnership** with the **Community College of Baltimore County**.
