CHRISTINA: Welcome to the Maryland State Department of Education's Division of Rehabilitation Services, or DORS, Office for Blindness and Vision Services.

CHRISTINA (Voice Over): The Office for Blindness and Vision Services, or OBVS...

VISUAL: A blind black woman with short natural hair and a bright fuchsia blazer smiles broadly as she stands in the courtyard of a modern office building.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): offers programs and services for individuals whose...

VISUAL: Close up on an arm in a purple sweatshirt. The hand at the end of the arm is reading a Braille document.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): disability is vision loss or blindness.

VISUAL: A Middle Eastern man with a mustache works and wearing headphones types on a keyboard in a corporate cubicle. His monitor is turned off and a long white can leans against a file cabinet behind him.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): If you have vision loss or blindness...

VISUAL: A white man with hair pulled back in a ponytail sweeps the floor in the lobby of the Johns Hopkins Institute for Cell Engineering.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): and have challenges getting or keeping a job...

VISUAL: A black man wearing a white sweatshirt, sunglasses and a backpack walks out of a door labeled Shipping and Receiving holding a long black cane.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): or living independently...

VISUAL: Christina is onscreen, speaking in front of a hospital cafeteria background.

CHRISTINA: then DORS OBVS may be the choice for you.

VISUAL: Brian is onscreen, speaking in front of a bakery café background.

BRIAN: OBVS teachers, counselors and technical specialists...

VISUAL: An Asian woman with her long hair back in a French braid works with a Braille computer keyboard and display in an office as another Asian woman coaches her.

BRIAN (V.O.): are specially trained to help individuals...

VISUAL: A woman in a brown blazer presents to colleagues in a conference room.

BRIAN (V.O.): who are blind, vision impaired or deaf-blind.

VISUAL: Slide that reads "DORS OBVS offers four service areas."

BRIAN (V.O.): OBVS offers four service areas:

VISUAL: A young blind woman wearing a safety helmet and eye protection on the floor of a factory with her supervisor. Over the image, the words: "1. Employment or Vocational Rehabilitation (VR)."

BRIAN (V.O.): Employment or vocational rehabilitation services, which help job seekers with disabilities become or stay employed.

VISUAL: Students walk between buildings on a busy college campus. Over the image, the words: "2. Transition Services."

BRIAN (V.O.): Transition services for Students with Disabilities, which are activities that prepare students with disabilities to move from school to post-school life.

VISUAL: Two DORS rehabilitation counselors for the blind sit behind an exhibit table at a conference. Over the image, the words: "3. Independent Living Older Blind (ILOB)."

BRIAN (V.O.): OBVS also runs the Independent Living Older Blind, or ILOB, program.

BRIAN (V.O.): ILOB rehabilitation specialists teach people with vision loss...

VISUAL: Two DORS rehabilitation counselors for the blind explain DORS programs to a blind woman visiting their exhibit table at a conference.

BRIAN (V.O.): aged 55 and over, how to become independent in their homes and communities.

VISUAL: Grand Opening of the BEP Café in a government office building. Over the image, the words: "4. Maryland Business Enterprise Program (BEP)."

BRIAN (V.O.): And OBVS manages the Maryland Business Enterprise Program for the Blind, or BEP.

VISUAL: The empty dining room of a BEP-operated cafeteria.

BRIAN (V.O.): BEP prepares individuals whose disability is blindness to operate successful retail concession...

VISUAL: A shopper looks over the selection of snacks and candy at a BEP-operated convenience store in a government building.

BRIAN (V.O.): food service, and vending operations in federal and State facilities.

VISUAL: Christina sits at a small round table covered by a red table cloth, reading from her Braille script.

CHRISTINA: Examples of OBVS services may include: career guidance and exploration; assistive technology, or AT, such as screen reading software, magnifiers...

VISUAL: Close up on Christina's hands as she reads from her Braille script.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): and low-vision aids; career training or academic education; independent living skills training, such as safe cooking techniques...

VISUAL: Christina sits at the table reading from her Braille script.

CHRISTINA: and managing personal care and household tasks; Orientation and Mobility, or O and M, such as instruction in safe travel or use of a long, white cane; and job placement.

VISUAL: A young black man with long braids navigates his wheelchair down a hallway using a long white cane.

BRIAN (V.O.): These services are designed to address your unique needs.

VISUAL: Photo of Brian speaking in a conference room, wearing a business suit and tie.

BRIAN (V.O.): You can find more information about specialized services...

VISUAL: Screen shot of the home page of the DORS website. In the URL bar, the address dors.maryland.gov appears one character at a time as if being typed.

BRIAN (V.O.): by going to the DORS website and selecting...

VISUAL: Screen shot of the "Specialized Services" page of the DORS website.

BRIAN (V.O.): "Specialized Services".

VISUAL: Christina is onscreen, speaking in front of a computer classroom background.

CHRISTINA: Employment Services and Student Employment Services are subject to eligibility requirements.

VISUAL: A bearded multiracial man wearing glasses and a gingham shirt speaks to a woman with blond hair in an office.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): Your DORS counselor will explain more about eligibility for DORS services.

VISUAL: Brian is onscreen, speaking in front of a glass-fronted corporate office space background.

BRIAN: If you're eligible or qualify for OBVS, you will be contacted about next steps.

VISUAL: An older black woman with long curly graying hair counsels a student seen only from the back in her office.

BRIAN (V.O.): Please be aware that there may be a waiting list for some DORS services.

VISUAL: A multiracial blind woman wearing an earbud looks up information on her iPhone using haptic touch while in a business meeting.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): If that happens, you will be given information about programs and services...

VISUAL: A blind black woman with short natural hair and a bright fuchsia blazer navigates through the outside courtyard of a modern office building with a long white cane.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): that may be able to help you while you are on the waiting list.

VISUAL: A young black man reads a book using a CCTV enlarging text on a monitor.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): If you are currently working and are struggling to keep your employment...

VISUAL: The young blind woman wearing a safety helmet and eye protection works on her machine in the factory.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): because of vision loss or blindness, discussing reasonable accommodations...

VISUAL: A young black man in an Oriole's cap and holding a long white cane stands in a garage near a tall stack of wooden screw clamps.

CHRISTINA (V.O.): could be the answer to addressing those difficulties. So you should discuss this with your DORS counselor.

VISUAL: Brian is onscreen, speaking in front of a hallway background featuring vending machines.

BRIAN: Ready to get started?

CHRISTINA (V.O.): Once the form is received, you'll be contacted via text, email, or letter and assigned to the appropriate staff. You'll receive a follow-up email or phone call to schedule your intake meeting.
